The 1886 Mt Tarawera eruption can be explored in depth by visiting two Rotorua attractions.

Students will visit sites relevant to the eruption which caused widespread devastation to the land and the loss of 120 lives.

Te Wairoa was the main village near Mt Tarawera during the eruption. Today it survives in a new form as the Buried Village. A true excavated village, remnants of life from the 1800s can still be seen.



The Whakarewarewa Thermal Village is where many survivors of the eruption rebuilt their lives and families. Explore the wonders of the geothermal resources used every day in a living village environment.

A comprehensive assessment of Rotorua Museum has shown it falls well below earthquake safety standards and will need to remain closed to the public for the foreseeable future.

Museum staff will continue to book the Buried and Whakarewarewa Villages for schools until the building reopens. Thus allowing this cost effective package for schools to continue.

Whakarewarewa Forest & Redwood Memorial Grove

This forest lies south east of Rotorua city and adjoins the Whakarewarewa Thermal village. Tall stands of Redwood cover a six hectare corner of the forest near the Visitor Information Centre. Each year many thousands of visitors admire the sheer magnificence of this stately grove of trees. They may choose to take advantage of the many walking, mountain biking and horse riding tracks in the forest.

Tikitapu (Blue Lake)

Lake Tikitapu, is a favourite for water -skiers, kayakers and family relaxation. The name Tikitapu comes from a legend where the daughter of a high born chief was bathing in its crystal waters. Wearing a Tikitapu (sacred greenstone neck ornament) the piece was held about her neck by



a tightly woven flax cord. The tiki was dislodged while she swam and lost. An extensive search followed as family searched for the sacred heirloom of her tribe but it was never found. The blue waters of the lake still hide the Tikitapu that was lost long ago.

Rotokakahi (Green Lake)

In days gone by the shores of this lake were heavily populated by Maori. Today the Green Lake is tapu (sacred), deserted this means no person European or Maori ventures upon it without good reason. Rotokakahi means "the lake of the shellfish. Its name is a reminder of those days when many fed from the food this lake offered. Kakahi are a delicious shellfish found in freshwater lakes. The island in the middle of the Green Lake serves as a burial ground to this very day and is the reason the lake is sacred. The Tuhourangi hapu (tribe) occupied this area before the Mount Tarawera eruption. It is the place where the bones of the famous Hinemoa, and many others lie buried.

2km past the Buried Village is a roadside lookout offering spectacular views of Lake Tarawera and the mountain beyond. Access to the lake edge can be gained from Tarawera Landing just a short drive pass the lookout.
